The election of a new Indonesian president has doomed his father, unless Taj can orchestrate a daring and dangerous jailbreak to save him. Gwynne has produced a character-driven rite-of-passage thriller that will be accessible and appealing to teens. Adults will be reminded of the deaths of Myuran Sukumaran and Andrew Chan, and there's a charged consideration of questions of law and morality - especially the ethics of capital punishment - snuck in among plenty of action and even more surfing."
